## When do I Start my Business?

Maybe your boss is a tyrant, and you know that you are smarter than her/him. Or, you see something that people want, and no one is filling that market void. For whatever reason – if you feel the entrepreneurial "push", you should seriously consider getting started now. Start smart – complete your business plan and be honest with yourself to see if you think you can survive out there – and go for it.
